Program Updates:

Suicide Prevention Service continues to support local residents through the 24/7 suicide crisis line, community outreach activities (including 2-day Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Trainings, Mental Health First Aid, and safeTALK), and bereavement support groups and services, as an accredited program through the American Association of Suicidology. Staff and volunteers at Suicide Prevention continue to do wonderful things in the community and go on to do important work throughout the Central Coast and in other areas of the state and country. Two of our current staff members are currently completing the Masters in Social Work program at CSUMB, and several volunteers this year have continued on to meaningful job opportunities and graduate level programs—congratulations!

Thank you to everyone who donated to and participated in last year's Coastal Trail Walk. We welcomed nearly 100 walkers and their human and canine family members and friends as we shared stories of hope and healing and raised funding for Suicide Prevention Service. Suicide Crisis Line

- From July 2015—June 2016, 43 new volunteer responders received 40+ hours of training to provide support and suicide and crisis intervention on the 24 hour Suicide Crisis Line.
- During the past year, volunteers responded to over 6,513 calls from individuals who were suicidal, in crisis, or concerned about the safety of someone else. In **over 93% of calls**, the person at risk de-escalated to the point of safety; other callers were connected with another resource to support them in staying safe.
- When gueried, 94% of callers stated that they found the call to be helpful.

Community Outreach

- From July 2015—June 2016, bilingual outreach personnel provided over 267 presentations and 24 trainings to 11,830 residents of Monterey, Santa Cruz, and San Benito counties.
- **95% of youth participants** stated on surveys that the outreach activity had a positive impact on their knowledge of suicide warning signs and ability to get help for themselves or another person.
- Program staff and volunteers distributed over 30,704 bilingual, educational materials to youth and adults across the Central Coast.

Suicide Prevention offers group bereavement support services for those grieving the death of a loved one from suicide. Support group attendees report that participating in a group can help reduce feelings of isolation, create safety to explore feelings, and empower participants to access resources for themselves and others.
