Workshop Description:

Disruptive behavior is extremely common in normal and clinical populations. This talk will address its development, the newly grouped diagnoses associated with it and bio-psycho-social causes and treatment. This past decade has seen a great deal of progress in the psychiatric and psychological literature, which has greatly advanced our understanding of disruptive behavior disorders. During the morning session, Dr. Steiner will review the history of disruptive behavior disorders, their updated diagnostic criteria and epidemiology. In the afternoon Dr. Kelly will discuss the etiology and treatment of disruptive behavior disorders. Dr. Kelly will also discuss the forensic implications of disruptive behavior disorders and their relevance to persons working with youth involved in our juvenile and criminal justice systems.

2. Participants will be familiarized with the taxonomy and diagnostic criteria for disruptive behavior disorders.

5. Participants will learn about comprehensive and integrated treatment approaches for disruptive behavior disorders.
6. Participants will be provided an overview of the forensic implications of disruptive behavior disorders.

Hans Steiner, MD is a child, adolescent and adult psychiatrist. He has over forty years of experience providing clinical consultation, evaluation and integrated treatment. He teaches Stanford undergraduates and graduate students. He maintains an active speaking schedule, traveling both nationally and internationally and in select cases he has been called on to provide expert forensic consultation. Over the past twenty years he has presented on many topics for FSA's conferences.

Michael Kelly, MD is a Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at Stanford where he serves as the Assistant Director for the Program in Psychiatry and the Law. Dr. Kelly is a Board certified general, child and adolescent and forensic psychiatrist. Dr. Kelly's academic interests include disruptive behavior disorders, community psychiatry, and violence risk assessment. Dr. Kelly is the Training Director for Stanford's Forensic Psychiatry Fellowship Program that is scheduled to begin in July of 2018.
